A Message From...

I went to the bank recently and was surprised when, as the teller took care of my banking needs, she offhandedly referred to me as, "my love."

I don't think I'd be alone in saying this made me uncomfortable. I'm not certain I'd met her before, though maybe I had. Nonetheless, it's not a way I'm accustomed to be addressed, even by those who know me.

I must have winced because she shifted the next couple times she addressed me to "Mr

Glenn." While this was awkward for other reasons I accepted it happily compared to the alternative. By the end of the transaction, however, she had reverted to a still-too-familiar-formy-taste, "my dear." I was cordial, but walked out shaking my head.

Maybe I should I cut her some slack.

Jesus once said, referring to the words he would speak to the righteous on the day of judgement, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Matthew 25:35). In saying this he was surely

referring to those at the margins of a society. He was also certainly referring to immigrants, migrants, and refugees, fulfilling in perfect love, an aspect of the Law spoken long before. For instance, the Lord had spoken to the Hebrew people once saying: "When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 29:33-34).

Jesus's command, imbued with love and channeling the full sentiments of the old Law is worth paying attention to in our time. As Christians it is a love to which we are still called, to extend dignity and welcome to "the stranger."

I celebrate the ways in which we try to do this at St Joe UMC. We make a home for those who find themselves in a strange land as refugees and migrants. When others reject and dehumanize, we have resisted this path. We can and should do this and more to recognize the humanity of the people of our city.

At the same time, it seems a challenge unique to our time that almost everyone I bump into is a "stranger" to me.

Most of us don't really know our neighbors. We don't really know the people we go to church with. We are uninformed at the loss of a job for the person sitting next to us on Sunday morning. We are uninitiated in the tears and trials of each other's lives even as people share more and more the meaningless details on social media.

I am constantly bumping into "strangers." By that I mean, people I thought I knew. I discover an opinion on a politician or a policy feels a personal judgement to them. I didn't intend that. I find my take on a cultural item or restaurant review is deemed a personal rejection. I didn't expect that. I find people all around who turn to artificial intelligence not only for the solution to technical problems but to navigate relationships as well- and even if it will be the end of us- it's no wonder. Suddenly, it seems my neighbors have become "strangers." I am in a strange land. I am the "stranger".

All of which causes me to look in a slightly different light on the designations the teller gave me. While they weren't exactly comfortable, she was trying to treat me as something other than a stranger. I think we could use more of that.

More of that for those who disagree with us! More of that in our homes! More of that with our children! Certainly, Absolutely, Positively more of that for those whom our society treats with contempt and cruelty! More of that in podcast conversations! More of that as we greet folks on Sunday morning!

Let's not treat each other like strangers. You don't need to call me "love," "dear," or "Mr." You can call me Glenn. I will call you friend- because a friend of Jesus can be a friend to anybody and everybody. It doesn't have to mean we always agree, but it does mean I refuse to treat anyone like a stranger. It won't be easy, but it will be what it means to be "For the Fort" in a time as strange as ours. I think Jesus will meet us there.

KeystoneSeniors For the Fort




