In the last few weeks we've explored what it means to 'Act Like Church' as we make our way through highlights of the book of Acts and explore some of the theology of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. One thing that I find fascinating and important in the book of Acts is how undefined the boundary is between clergy and laity.

It has always seemed a bit incredible to me that I get paid to do what all Christians are supposed to do. It is all the more incredible when one considers that there are not a tremendous number of titles or trappings that separate laity and clergy in the book of Acts. In fact, the technical designation of clergy doesn't seem to exist yet. What does exist from the very beginning is the Call.

The truth of the matter is that while some people in the earliest church were clearly set apart by a specific call (Peter, Paul, Silas, Barnabas, Stephen, Priscilla, Aquila, and so on) there are many others who are called but in a different manner (Lydia, Cornelius, etc). The specific call to people set apart for service to God and the church can sometimes be hard to describe or define. It is a call to preach good news, to share sacraments, to serve, and to help order the life of the church. It is a call that I believe comes from God. Eugene Peterson, the author of the Message translation of

the bible, captured both the nature of the call and its dubious distinction from the normative Christian life well in many of his writings. I appreciate his definition of the call better than almost any other. In his work <u>Under the Unpredictable Plant</u> he wrote, "The pastoral vocation is not a glamorous career; it's a calling to live in the mess of humanity and find Christ there."


Clearly, this doesn't make a pastor any more special than anyone else. It locates us not in a place of glory, but in the midst of life's ordinary human mess. This seems to capture both my own experience, but also what we see described in the book of Acts, where distinctions between believers are dubious at best.

All that being said, I'm thankful for those who have answered that call and serve at St Joe UMC especially. Pastor Ron VerLee blesses us with his wit and woo. Pastor Luke Rumple graces us with his wholeheartedness and warmth. Pastor Ashley Moreland embraces us with her wisdom and welcome. It's a team that works well for others and fits well together (a member of the SPRC recently described the pastoral team as fitting together like the joints of well-crafted wooden furniture).

Now, I'm not the only one who is thankful for this team, the Staff Parish Relations Committee is as well too. For that reason they want you to be reminded of Pastor Appreciation Month. table or find a chaplain nearby. You can write it down, share it, or take a moment to pray together. $\Box\Box$


